



Dear Member,

Our records show that you may be due for a colon cancer screening. With a variety of available screening options, you can now choose one that suits you best. We work with Exact Sciences, an independent company, and the independent health screening organization Life Line Community Healthcare to provide you with Cologuard[®], a non-invasive in-home screening test that's an alternative to a colonoscopy and is available at no cost to you.

Cologuard will be sent to your home unless you opt out of our Cologuard screening campaign by September 20, 2024.

If you have completed a Cologuard screening within the last three years, you may not receive a Cologuard kit as part of this program as you are up to date with your screening. If you already have a Cologuard kit, please use it to collect your sample and return it as soon as possible.

COLOGUARD SHOULD NOT BE USED IF YOU:

- Have a history of colorectal cancer, adenomas, or other related cancers.
- Had a positive result from another colorectal cancer screening test within the last six months.
- Have a condition that places you at high risk for colorectal cancer, including inflammatory bowel disease (IBD) or certain hereditary syndromes or a family history of colorectal cancer.

WHY SCREEN FOR COLON CANCER?

- Colon cancer affects all races, genders, and ethnicities.¹
- It's often considered the most preventable form of cancer.^{2,3}
- The American Cancer Society recommends starting to screen at age 45 (or earlier if you have increased risk).⁴

WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS OF SCREENING WITH COLOGUARD?

Cologuard is one of the many options you now can choose from to screen for colon cancer. There are many benefits to this option.



Cologuard is convenient. The test will be delivered right to your house. Use it whenever works best for you.



Cologuard is quick, clean, and comfortable. At-home screening takes just minutes, and may be a more convenient option than a colonoscopy procedure. Cologuard is for adults 45 years of age or older who are at average risk of colon cancer. If you have polyps, inflammatory bowel disease (IBD), certain hereditary syndromes, personal risk, or a family history of colorectal cancer, ask your doctor if Cologuard is right for you.

INDICATIONS AND IMPORTANT RISK INFORMATION

Cologuard is intended to screen adults 45 years of age and older who are at average risk for colorectal cancer by detecting certain DNA markers and blood in the stool. Do not use if you have had adenomas, have inflammatory bowel disease and certain hereditary syndromes, or a personal or family history of colorectal cancer. Cologuard is not a replacement for colonoscopy in high-risk patients. Cologuard performance in adults ages 45-49 is estimated based on a large clinical study of patients 50 and older. Cologuard performance in repeat testing has not been evaluated.

The Cologuard test result should be interpreted with caution. A positive test result does not confirm the presence of cancer. Patients with a positive test result should be referred for colonoscopy. A negative test result does not confirm the absence of cancer. Patients with a negative test result should discuss with their doctor when they need to be tested again. False positives and false negative results can occur. In a clinical study, 13% of people without cancer received a positive result (false positive) and 8% of people with cancer received a negative result (false negative). Rx only.
